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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The renowned '**Mashtarmoshai**' of Uluberia, **Shri. Haripada Ghoshal**, envisioned a goal of establishing a higher educational institution to provide better educational opportunities to local students, especially the girls. As a result, Uluberia College, his brain-child, started its journey on **16th August**, **1948**.

Uluberia College is a government-aided general degree college, affiliated to the University of Calcutta. The college offers **16 UG courses including a B. Ed. Section, 2 PG courses, Distance Learning Centre (under NSOU), NCC & NSS** courses and a varied array of **Add-on/certificate, value added and skill development courses**. With an adequate number of experienced and enthusiastic faculties and sufficient non-teaching staff, the college caters to over seven thousand students, annually.

Uluberia College aims at providing a tech-enhanced teaching-learning environment. The **College App** (One **Institution; One Digital Platform**) has facilitated all stakeholders to access, include and empower themselves in the teaching-learning process. The college is well-equipped with **smart classrooms. Boost Biotechnology Laboratory and Central Animal Facility** are our on-campus pre-clinical research hubs. Our **Central Computer Laboratory** provides computers with highspeed internet connectivity for enriching digital education. A **Digital Language Lab** facility is also available for English and Bengali Method students. Our **Central Library** is well resourced with over **50,000 books** and is fully automated through the advanced **Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), using KOHA software.**

Furthermore, the college has taken significant measures for energy conservation through installing solarpanels, energy efficient LED lighting system and sensor-based switches in classrooms. The campus is like a green oasis, enriched through frequent tree plantation programmes, terrace gardening and organic water gardening. For sustainable development, the institution has undertaken initiatives, *viz.* e-waste management, rainwater harvesting and automatic drip irrigation system; and has introduced courses like bio-compost making from kitchen waste and mushroom cultivation.

We extend **our sustainable development initiatives beyond campus** to incorporate local schools, as well. In view, the college has arranged local awareness programmes, *viz*. **Health Awareness Rallies, Book-Walks, School Campus Cleaning Drives, etc.** 'Mobile Library' was our unique outreach community activity where our students read out books, newspapers, and magazines to local elderly citizens, fostering community bonds and bridging generation gaps through shared reading experiences. The institution also interacts with local schools through collaborative programmes like IKS awareness programmes, 'Physics to Nurture Young Minds' workshops etc.

Uluberia College, thus, serves as a guiding force for educational and comprehensive development of the students and the community.

Vision

Committed to holistic education, Uluberia College integrates technology into its diverse curriculum, fostering critical thinking, creativity, and ethical values through innovative teaching methods and research opportunities. 1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- 1. **Digitised Teaching-Learning**: The **College App** has revitalized the teaching-learning environment of the institution with its seamless interactive platform. It helps in keeping a digital record of all the academic and non-academic activities of the institution. An effective Learning Management System (LMS) facilitates streamlined course management, enhances student engagement, and provides valuable analytics to support educational outcomes.
- 2. Library Facility: A well-stocked library and reading facilities along with e-resources make reference work easier. The Central Library is fully automated using the KOHA library management software and provides access to over 50,000 books. The college also offers e-resources through the N-LIST program, ensuring students have access to a wide range of academic materials.
- 3. **Sustainability:** Uluberia College is dedicated to sustainability and has implemented various ecofriendly measures. The college utilizes solar panels for energy, employs sensor-controlled lighting in classrooms, and has systems for harvesting rainwater. The college frequently conducts tree planting campaigns and organic gardening projects, which support environmental conservation and teach students about sustainable practices.
- 4. **Innovative Research and Extension Activities:** The college has established a Biotechnology laboratory and a Central Animal Facility. These facilities contribute to ongoing research in various fields, particularly in areas such as biotechnology and life sciences. Various innovative extension activities like Mushroom Cultivation, Compost Farming, Scientific model development, Campus Bazaar add to the skill enhancement and entrepreneurship of students.

- 5. Strong NCC & NSS Units: The college has a robust and active NCC and NSS wing.
- 6. **Decentralized Administration:** The administrative responsibilities have been distributed among various dedicated committees for the smooth running of the institutional administration. Technology-driven transparent administration, along with active alumni engagement, and a dedicated grievance portal to address student concerns make the system effective.
- 7. **Convenient Location:** The college is conveniently located at the heart of the town, with well-connected transportation.
- 8. **Inclusivity Through Community Harmony:** A strong emphasis is always put forward on fostering human values like tolerance, communal harmony, and inclusivity among students and staff by nurturing a sense of fraternity, friendliness, and solidarity among stakeholders from diverse ethnic, religious, socioeconomic, cultural, and regional backgrounds.
- 9. **Continuous Upgradation of Infrustructure:** It ensures that facilities remain modern, functional, and responsive to the evolving needs of the institution. All classrooms and seminar halls have Wi-Fi/LAN connections. This ongoing enhancement supports a productive environment and enhances overall efficiency.
- 10. **Social Awareness:** Promoting sensitization and awareness of gender equality, sexual harassment, women's empowerment, and leadership through both curricular initiatives and extracurricular activities make students aware of their social responsibility.
- 11. **Safety and security** : Students' safety has always been under prime concern for the College authorities. Apart from 24×7 security services, the entire campus is monitored through CCTV surveillance.

Institutional Weakness

- 1. **Teacher-Student Ratio:** We are contantly striving to accomodate visiting teachers to maintain a healthy teacher-student ratio within our limited scope being a Govt. aided institution.
- 2. Scarcity of Fund: The college requires more funded projects for quality research and development of patents.
- 3. **Infrustructure:** Given the number of students that the institution caters to, classrooms are limited. The reading space in the library is limited.
- 4. **Student-Computer Ratio:** Adding more computers is a part of our ongoing efforts to improve all technology oriented amenities.
- 5. **Sports Facilities:** The college does not have its own playground.

Institutional Opportunity

- 1. **Digital literacy through college app:** Adequate usage of the College App for all academic and institutional activities promotes digital literacy.
- 2. Engagement in Research activity: Engagement of a greater number of students in research activities with the help of efficient research facilities. The current curriculum of CCF under NEP 2020, facilitates us a lot in this direction via inclusion of research oriented courses.

- 3. **Placement by career counselling programmes:** Placement of majority of the students can be ensured with more career counselling programmes in organised industrial sector as well as local industries.
- 4. **Increase in collaborative work:** Collaboration with other educational institutions, local NGOs & industries will make the teaching learning process better. MoUs signed with various colleges will increase synergic spirit. Collaboration with local industries will help the students for placement in different sectors.
- 5. **Community enhancement:** More community-based activities will help to boost the surroundings for a better future. The college aims at nurturing the surrounding locale of the institution.
- 6. **From inclusion to nurturing possibilites**: Uluberia College, holding a status of pioneering HEI in this area, caters to a huge number of students. This gives us the oppotunity to communicate viably with the society concerning with social, environmental and health related issues and awareness campaigns.

Institutional Challenge

- 1. **Teacher-student ratio:** Teacher-student ratio cannot be maintained due to the admission of a huge number of students in every academic session.
- 2. **Infrastructural limitations:** The college faces difficulty in accommodating the bulk of students of BA courses in the classrooms. With the introduction of CCF system along with the on going CBCS system it has become a challenge for the college to provide necessary infrastructural facilities.
- 3. Language barrier: Most of the students belonging to the vernacular medium face language barriers in learning process specifically in tech-oriented education. However, the college is trying to bridge this gap through soft skill programmes.
- 4. **Hostel Accommodation:** The college has a Ladies Hostel building but there is an acute shortage of students requiring hostel facility.
- 5. **Financial background**: Uluberia College hosts most of its students coming from a weak financial background. Keeping them focused in academic direction is thus a challenge for us.
- 6. Arrangement and proper allocation of fund: Given our high student enrolment, providing adequate infrastructural and digital facilities are further institutional challenges. Ample fund allocation would be needed for new infrastructural incorporation and digital & academic upgradation.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The Curricular Aspects form the backbone of our educational institution. However, being an affiliated college under the University of Calcutta, Uluberia College is essentially a teaching unit where the syllabi and guidelines are framed by the University.

Curriculum Planning and Delivery

Our college operationalizes the curriculum within the overall framework provided, in one's own way depending on its resource potential, institutional goals. The college meticulously plans its academic sessions with timely preparation of academic calendars, routines, and the distribution of courses. The syllabit taught across different programmes are supplemented with experiential learning through field trips/project works.

Continuous Internal Evaluation

The Continuous Internal Evaluation of the students is an integral part of the teaching-learning process, and it is conducted by the departments by means of assignments, class tests, student seminar competition, and internal assessment examination. It encourages the students to progress continuously in the semester leading to thorough understanding of the course.

Certificate/ Add-on Courses

As a part of academic flexibility, every department successfully conducts several Certificate / Add On courses which have a certain inter-disciplinary and skill enhancement thrusts. These Supplementary enrichment programmes try to bridge the gap between the disciplines and our college has offered as many as 34 Add On / Certificate Courses in the academic session 2018 to 2023 on a variety of subjects which have become very popular with our students.

Crosscutting Issues

The Institution capably integrates issues on professional ethics, gender, human values, and environmental sustainability to help students cope with the challenges of modern living. The crosscutting issues of professional ethics, gender, human values, environment, and sustainability are well integrated, assimilated and reflected in the existing curriculum with the aim of its enrichment. Our faculty members highlight these issues while teaching in the classrooms. Beyond academic limits, the NSS organizes various character-building ventures throughout the year. Activities such as cleanliness and plantation drives, world environment day celebrations, and awareness programs on water conservation and plastic hazards instill a sense of responsibility in college youth. These efforts enhance awareness of the environment, promoting a holistic understanding of our natural surroundings and habitat.

Feedback System

We have an active process of collecting feedback from all stakeholders like students, teachers, employers, and alumni in terms of academic relevance and appropriateness. These are simultaneously being analysed and addressed issues which help to better the learning effectiveness.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Uluberia College has exhibited a relentless zeal in enhancing the **Teaching-Learning and Evaluation** Processes of the institution.

Admission Process:

• The college has adopted a fair, transparent Online Admission system following the Admission circulars and Reservation policies of the State Government and The University of Calcutta. The

first year enrolment percentage of the college for the last five years is **80.15%** and enrolment percentage in reserved category for the same time period is **65.69%**.

Experiential, Participative and Problem-solving Teaching Learning Methodologies:

- Practical classes, project works, dissertations and assignments, field trips, internships are a part and parcel of the curricula of various departments. The college emphasizes on community based learning for the holistic development of the students; a unique initiative called **"Mobile Library"** has been launched by the institution.
- Student seminars, webinars, workshops, hands-on training programmes, skill development courses, certificate courses, debates, quizzes are organized on regular intervals. Career counseling programmes, competitions, awareness programmes on various social, cultural, environmental and life-style issues are conducted frequently. The college has active ELC (Electoral Literacy Club), Eco-club and Drama club.
- The students develop innovative models like **censored dustbin**, water light, crystal engineering. Practical training programmes on **Mushroom cultivation**, sanitizer and soap making, essential oil preparation are conducted in the college premises. Students also actively participate in NCC and NSS programmes.

ICT Infrastructure:

• The college offers multifarious **ICT infrastructure** primary amongst which is the dedicated **Uluberia College App** which offers a smooth teaching-learning experience to the student and teachers. The app is a one stop go for class-routines, examination-routines, class attendance, notice circulation, library access, fees payment and all other academic as well as non-academic activities of the college. Apart from the app the college has other ICT facilities like **smart classrooms, LMS, Language Lab, Inflibnet subscription, Youtube channel** etc.

Faculty Profile and Strength:

• The College boasts a diverse faculty with a blend of youthful energy and seasoned experience. **86.10%** sanctioned posts for full time teachers are filled; **81.01%** of whom are qualified with NET/SET/Ph. D. degrees.

Internal & External Examination Procedure and Examination oriented Grievances

- The college conducts **Internal and External Examinations** according to the university guidelines and follows a comprehensive internal assessment system to gauge student-progress.
- The institution has a dedicated **Examination Grievance Redressal Committee** that solves the examination related grievances immediately and effectively.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Uluberia College, one of the oldest and largest higher educational institute in Howrah district is committed to maintaining its legacy in its strive for excellence.

Academic and Physical Infrastructure

Uluberia College covering an area of **3.1acres and built up of 3447.66 sq m offers** 75 classrooms including well facilitated departmental laboratories covering 18 undergraduate, 2 postgraduate programs and a B. Ed section. The **BOOST** laboratory caters to an advanced research along with **centralised Computer facility**. The classrooms are well equipped with modern teaching aids **like LCD projectors with screen**, **Smart boards and Interactive Digital panels**, with supporting tools like Google Classroom, ZOOM, Language Lab and an LMS for extended learning. Animal house and medicinal garden offers experimental initiatives. Other facilities include separate canteens for students and teachers, water purifiers, roof top garden, fire extinguishers and CC cameras for safety and security. Rain water harvesting, solar panels, green generator, and E waste recycling adds to sustainable initiatives. Disabled friendly efforts include elevator, wheelchair, ramps and washrooms. The college also offers a first aid station, regular medical check -ups, a sanitary vending machine and incinerator in girls wash room.

Library Facilities

The college library located in the **block B** of the campus consists of the **Central library** along with some well managed **Departmental libraries.** The present number of books available are around **fifty thousand.** There are facilities of Online Educational Resources (OER) repository, Online Attendance, Reprographic services, vending machine and Open Access Library for students and teachers where Students can self check-in and check-out through College APP /QR code in library tablets. The library is fully automated using an advanced Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) using KOHA Software, installed in the year 2015 which serves as the backbone of its organizational and operational activities. The library subscribes to a vast array of e-resources, including e-books, e-journals through N-LIST. The institution has memberships in The British Council Library and USIS Library , Kolkata which the faculty and students can access.

Cultural Activities

Music Club and Drama Club have been opened for the interest of students. The college can also boast of the presence of **Uluberia College Choir** and their performances. The institution annually celebrates cultural programs and important occassions of national and international significance at the on-campus Haripada Mancha & Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar Auditorium, and at Rabindra Bhavan, located off-campus in the local vicinity.

Sports Facilities

The college facilitates a range of indoor and outdoor **sports amenities** including carrom, table tennis, football, cricket gear, chess, ludo and accessories for athletics. **Karate training** is regularly conducted by external trainers. **A designated ground** is available for outdoor games and sports. The institution has newly established **Student Activity Centre** for physical exercise, yoga and related activities .

IT infrastructure

The institution is committed to maintaining state-of-the-art IT facilities like College APP, LMS, online (feedback, grievance, fees payment, admission, examination) portals, student profile mapping, Wi -Fi etc. and various software with three broad band high speed internet (1 GBPS, 400MBPS and 500MBPS), one BSNL & JIO broadband all monitored by dedicated technical staff through a server room. The IT facilities are maintained through annual contracts. The overall Wi-Fi and LAN network infrastructure are secured by UTM technology.

Student Support and Progression

Uluberia College provides comprehensive support for student progression through several key initiatives.

Scholarships and Financial Aid: The college actively implements various government schemes, including Kanyashree, Aikyashree, SVMCM, NSP, OASIS, and the Students' Credit Card, to assist students financially. In addition, the "Student Aid Fund" offers internal support, and during the pandemic, a 50% fee waiver was granted to all students. Over the past five years, more than 30,000 students have benefited from these efforts. Philanthropic contributions further enhance financial support, helping students overcome economic barriers.

Capacity Building and Skills Enhancement: Uluberia College offers a range of programs designed to build skills for future success. These include soft skills, language and communication, physical activities (such as yoga and karate), health and hygiene awareness, and technological skills. Workshops provide hands-on training, fostering entrepreneurship and practical skills essential for career advancement.

Career Counselling and Competitive Examination Guidance: The college has trained over 24,000 students in career guidance and competitive exams in the last five years. The college has dedicated entry-in-service portal which contains more than 48000 questions in mathematics, GK and language. This support has enabled many students to pursue higher education and secure employment, demonstrating the effectiveness of the

college's career counseling services.

Sports and Cultural Participation: Uluberia College emphasizes both cultural and athletic development. Over the past five years, the college has organized more than 130 cultural programs, encouraging students to develop their skills. Additionally, students have participated in over 43 sports events and won approximately 56 awards, reflecting strong support for sports activities.

Alumni Association: The college maintains an active and registered Alumni Association that assists current students by providing valuable insights and professional connections, helping them navigate career opportunities and develop fruitful interactions with the external world. They also contribute as philanthropists.

Grievance Redressal and Anti-Ragging Measures: Strict protocols are followed for addressing student grievances, adhering to government and UGC guidelines. The college also enforces a comprehensive anti-ragging policy, including mandatory declarations from students and guardians, supported by dedicated grievance and anti-ragging cells.

Overall, Uluberia College's multifaceted approach ensures robust support for student development, addressing financial, academic, and personal needs effectively.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Institutional Vision and Leadership:

Governance, Leadership and Management of Uluberia College align with its vision and mission to *acquire, analyze and apply* **knowledge** for educational excellence. In the last 5 years (FY 2018 -23), it has endeavored towards NEP implementations of **CCF and ABC**, and has fully implemented **E-governance** in academic, administration, finance and student support. Our **policies**, approved by the Governing Body, are deployed through Committees and Subcommittees. **Appointments** are as per WBCSC and SACT norms.

Strategy Development and Deployment:

The institution has incorporated NAAC's previous recommendations in its strategy development.

For sustainable development, it has introduced energy conservation measures like drip-harvesting system, motion-sensory system, solar panels, etc. It has extended, renovated and re-constructed its infrastructure, installed fire-extinguishers and has filled vacant teacher-posts.

For student development, IQAC has constructed yoga, karate, and gym rooms, initiated value-added courses on soap-making, compost-making from kitchen-waste, organized outreach activities like locality-based medical camps, rallies and mobile libraries, and has Student Aid-Fund Policy.

Blended Method, Experiential and **ICT-based learning** have been initiated through **College App**, **licensed ZOOM App** and College **YouTube**.

For research, IQAC publishes 'Quest' and several student journals. New research infrastructure - Animal House in BOOST Laboratory, Innovation Centre, Dark Room and Mushroom Cultivation Room were developed. Our faculty Dr. Tapas Kumar Samanta has supervised Ph.D. programs under University of

Calcutta.

Faculty Empowerment Strategies:

For **staff's professional development**, in the last 5 years, **150 teachers** have been **reimbursed** as per Financial Support Policy and **238 teachers** have attended FDPs & RCs, organised by UGC-HRDCs and collaborative ATPs & PDPs, organised by the IQAC.

Our Performance Appraisal System includes document verification for CAS, self-appraisal online staff reports,360 degree teacher's appraisal system, AAA SWOC Analysis and feedback from all stakeholders.

Our institution has both statutory and non-statutory staff welfare means.

Financial Management and Resource Mobilization:

In the last 5 years, the college has **mobilised fund** from institutions, like *Inclusion and Diversity Funding*, *Royal Society of Chemistry*, London, *TLC-IIT*, Kharagpur, etc. Fund has also been received from philanthropists, Royalty from Computer Centre, RUSA, selling scraps, e-waste management in collaboration with *Hulladek Recycling Pvt. Ltd*, etc. The institution has **utilised fund** for renovation, procurements through e-tendering, research, infrastructural maintenance, organising programs, financial support, etc.

Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS):

For quality assurance, IQAC has enrolled the institution in **NIRF**, has conducted **NCTE-PAR**, annual **AAA** and has organised **MoU-based collaborative activities**.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Uluberia College is deeply committed to fostering an inclusive, sustainable, and socially responsible educational environment through promotion of gender equity, environmental sustainability, community engagement, and cultural diversity.

Gender Equity and Sensitization

Key infrastructure supporting these efforts include:

- CCTV surveillance and 24x7 security services.
- Girls' common room equipped with sanitary napkin dispensers and an incinerator.
- Gymnasium and Karate Training centres to encourage physical fitness and self-defence.

Environmental and Energy Conservation

Uluberia College has taken several steps to minimize its ecological footprint. These initiatives include:

- 25 KWp Roof-top Solar Panel.
- Conversion to energy-efficient LED lighting and sensor-based switches in classrooms.
- Waste management practices, including source segregation, composting of biodegradable materials, and responsible e-waste disposal.
- Implementation of **rainwater harvesting** and **water-efficient drip irrigation fixtures** to conserve water resources.

The campus has been transformed into a green space with ongoing **tree plantation drives** and **organic and medicinal gardening**. The college's efforts are validated through **ISO certifications** and regular **Green and Energy audits**.

Disabled-Friendly, Barrier-Free Environment through ramps, lifts, and washrooms and provisions for wheelchairs facility for Divyangjan persons.

Inclusivity and Diversity

Uluberia College fosters **cultural, linguistic, regional, and socioeconomic inclusivity**. Various initiatives ensure that students feel a sense of belonging, including:

- Cultural festivals celebrating regional diversity.
- Multilingual lesson delivery to accommodate diverse linguistic backgrounds.
- Financial aid for socioeconomically disadvantaged students, along with a subsidized canteen for all.
- Grievance Redressal and Inclusivity: Special cells address RTI, ICC, SC/ST, and minority issues.

The **Electoral Literacy Club** plays a crucial role in educating the college community about constitutional values, rights, and responsibilities, ensuring civic participation.

Best Practices

The college has introduced innovative practices aimed at benefiting both the campus and the wider community:

- A mobile library service run by students for elderly citizens, fostering intergenerational engagement.
- A self-developed **mobile app** to enhance **e-governance** and **e-learning** for students and faculty.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	In a multidisciplinary or interdisciplinary approach, education is not limited by subject-boundaries. The approach aims to understand complex issues not in isolation but by interlinking it with other perspectives, methods, and subjects so as to get a comprehensive and holistic view of the problem which makes finding solutions, easier. It is founded upon collaboration and synergy among different study-fields like science, humanities, social sciences, and arts, where the subsequent insights and interstices among subjects can be easily explored. Uluberia College, being affiliated to University of Calcutta, follows the syllabi and guidelines, as laid out by the university. In the academic session 2018-19, University of Calcutta introduced the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) which shifted learning towards being multidisciplinary. For example, skill-based courses (SEC subjects), compulsory Environmental Studies, and Bengali and English language courses were introduced in all streams (Humanities, Science and Commerce). Aligning with the of National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 guidelines, the university next introduced the Curriculum and Credit Framework (CCF) system is also inclined towards the interdisciplinary approach. Within the stipulated framework, students can consider one Major discipline, one Minor discipline and one Interdisciplinary approach. Within the stipulated framework, students to experience internship in specialized aspects of their chosen discipline, thereby providing them with a practical learning environment. The CCF system is a progressive way of learning that allows students to have cross- disciplinary conversations, critical thinking, problem solving and develop skills to face a global world. Additionally, the CCF gives a holistic view of education where students learn to see the connections between knowledge and real world issues. By bridging the gap between theory and practice, students appreciate the value of their education and its impact on society.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) system is a virtual storehouse that contains information on credits, earned by individual students. It allows

	students to have multiple entry and exit points in a particular course as well as to seamlessly move from one institution to another, tracking their earned credits as they journey through courses and institutions. ABC Id gives the students the chance to collect their credits as well as to utilise the National Credit Transfer Framework (NCTF) where they can learn from MOOCs, made available online through govt. portals like SWAYAM, NPTEL, NDL, Swayamprabha etc. Uluberia College, affiliated with University of Calcutta, has introduced the Academic Credit Bank system from the 2024-25 session onwards. A new column has been added in the Admission Registration Form from this year, which will make it mandatory to insert the ABC Id. This is definitely one of the most welcoming steps adopted by the university, keeping in view the new CCF system, introduced from 2023-24 session in light of NEP 2020. As also being the need of the hour, this will provide students a better opportunity to venture into new avenues of learning and forge firmer grasps over skill-based learning.
3. Skill development:	In its attempt to reshape the dynamics of the current education system, NEP, 2020 has made a paradigm shift towards skill-based education and experiential learning, making apprenticeship and entrepreneurship, its learning objectives. The shift demands an early integration of vocational training with general academic learning. It does so to inform students about the job market-favourable skills as well as to help students to locate their respective vocations for career-building. Uluberia College, being a non-autonomous body, follows the curriculum of University of Calcutta under CBCS and CCF system which aligns with the objectives of NEP, 2020. The university curricula for UG and PG Courses have, both, theoretical knowledge and practical applications. The internal policies of Uluberia College for enhancement of its teaching- learning process is well curated to bridge the gap between skill and academics. Few such initiatives are: 1. According to the CBCS and CCF curricula, Skill Enhancement Courses are taught in programs like Chemistry, Botany, Physics, B.Ed. etc. 2. As per IQAC recommendations, thirty-two Add-on courses have been initiated which aimed at providing the much-needed knowledge exposure, outside

prescribed curriculum to students. 3. The college has taken up additional initiatives to organize various skill development activities like Spoken Sanskrit Course, Communicative English Courses, Computer Concept Courses in collaboration with The Institute of Computer Engineers (India), Certificate courses in Advanced Excel Training in collaboration with Right Brains Technology etc. 4. To promote physical fitness and self-defence, the college has introduced Yoga Classes in collaboration with Sri Sri Rural Development Programme Trust, and Karate classes in collaboration with Traditional Shoto Karate Association of Bengal (TSKAB). 5. A hands-on training workshop for soap making has been conducted under the supervision of Dr. Shyamal Kumar Sarkar by the Department of Chemistry. 6. A three Months Certificate Course on "Mushroom Cultivation Practices" in collaboration with CCAE, Vidyasagar University, is carried out by the Department of Botany on particular intervals. 7. The college has introduced a certificate course on CPBFI (Certificate Programme in Banking, Finance and Insurance) in collaboration with Centum Learning Limited, a Training Partner of Bajaj Finserv Limited, to provide the students with best opportunities for career advancement and specific skill development. 8. To promote value education among the students and to nurture socially responsible citizens, the college organizes social outreach activities. A collaborative cultural programme was organized where specially-abled children from a local special educational institute "ASHA BHAVAN", participated alongside the students of our college. The students of our college went on an outreach programme at a local orphanage "CHIRONABIN" to socialize with the children out there, thus, ensuring experiential social learning. 9. College Journal: Uluberia College releases a peer-reviewed journal titled QUEST, aiming to foster research acumen among both faculty members and students. Various departments contribute to the publication of wall magazines and e-magazines as part of their efforts to promote scholarly endeavours. 10. The Placement Cell of Uluberia College has enabled a Competitive Examination Portal for training the students for various competitive examinations in collaboration with Right Brains Technology.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Anchored in Indian philosophy, science, arts, literature, and spirituality, the tapestries of intellectual tradition that the IKS (Indian Knowledge System) has developed over millennia, are very rich and diverse. IKS is based on ancient texts of the Vedas, Upanishads, and the epics that provide a holistic view of life, the universe, and of existence itself. IKS thrives in the interrelationship of various branches of knowledge; it visualizes each branch not in isolation but as intertwined into each other to present knowledge as being whole, living and applicable. This holistic take on knowledge has given way to disciplines like Ayurveda, Yoga, and Vastu Shastra, where not only do the body and mind relate harmoniously, but also the human life with his environment. NEP 2020 has, thus, in its acknowledgement for the significance and relevance of IKS, has embedded it deep into the current modern education system. Its propagation for vernacular medium of learning has developed the study of local languages, art and culture. As for Uluberia College, its faculties and students have always been prompt in learning and manifesting their indigenous language, culture and knowledge. The Bangla Bhasha and Sahitya department arranges seminars and academic programmes on 21st February every year in commemoration to the International Mother Language Day. The Sanskrit Dept. has organized a Spoken Sanskrit Programme in collaboration with Sanskrit Bharti from 17th to 27th November, 2022. The practice of Yoga and meditation is quite regular among our students. College has introduced IKS as a CVAC paper in its current CCF program.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The high academic standards, across curriculum, are maintained in the institution through constant pursuit for excellence through Outcome-based Education. Strategies like continuous formative assessment and curriculum mapping are used to overcome challenges in the teaching and learning process. To align with the altering knowledge paradigms and to help students attained the prescribed learning outcomes, University of Calcutta, periodically, updates its Undergraduate & Postgraduate curricula. The institute has in place a formal mentor-mentee program where faculty members take on various roles

as instructors, trainers, facilitators, and mentors, as may be desired, for a certain outcome to be achieved.

	Alumni seminars are held to help our students, learn from the success stories. It motivates and improves students' focus in the respective field, helping them to attain the kind of results as expected from the respective curriculum.
6. Distance education/online education:	Uluberia College, in affiliation with Vidyasagar University, offers Distance Education in Postgraduate Courses, viz. Bengali, History, Sanskrit, English, Botany, Mathematics and Zoology, since 2008. However, due to unavoidable circumstances, Postgraduate courses in Botany, Mathematics and Zoology had to be discontinued. Bachelor in Library Science Course was introduced in 2018. Under the affiliation of Netaji Subhas Open University, Undergraduate Honours and Postgraduate courses in Bengali, English, Political Science and History were introduced. Postgraduate Course in Mathematics, MLIS and MSW courses were started in 2018. Post- pandemic Distance Education Classes were resumed in the offline mode. Our Distance Education facility caters to a large section of students, who face difficulty in continuing their formal education in regular mode, thereby, enabling future learning opportunities.

Workshops and seminars are organized to educate students on the significance of their electoral rights and the procedures for enrolling in the electoral roll. Additionally, special registration drives are held on campus, where students can conveniently complete their voter registration with the assistance of trained volunteers and staff. The college also collaborates with local election authorities to ensure that the registration process is smooth and efficient. Information desks and help-centres are set up during key periods to assist students with any queries or issues, they might face while registering. These efforts aim to ensure that every eligible student at Uluberia College is enrolled as a voter, thereby strengthening their democratic participation and representation among the youth. Through these initiatives, the college has emphasized the importance of civic responsibility and the role of young voters in shaping the future of the nation.

(b) Routine Preparation: The Routine Committee, in alignment with the Academic Calendar, prepares a master routine, maintaining choice based credit structure.

(c) Library books upgradation: The College Library annually updates its catalogue. Its KOHA software provides e-services through OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogues) and N-LIST facilities.

(d) **Design and dissemination of course plan:** Each faculty prepares a teaching plan that includes detailed course plan, text books, reference books, web resources etc. and it is shared to the students prior to starting a new semester after approval of departmental meeting.

2. Curriculum Delivery:

(a) **Dedicated College App:** It is used for online exams, project work submission, user-friendly interface for staff attendance, class attendance and to conduct Add-on courses. During the pandemic, online classes were taken via the app and YouTube channel.

(b) **Teaching material:** Quality study material is uploaded in LMS well advance. Suggestive questions along with previous year are provided.

(c) Traditional Method plus ICT tools: Both traditional chalk-talk way and advanced experiential learning methods and flipped classrooms are used. ICT tools like Google Classrooms, Google Meet,

Zoom platform, smart panels are used to enhance learning experiences. Along with text books, power point presentations, video tutorials and laboratories are used for multi-sensory learning. Departmental field works and educational tours are conducted for experiential learning.

(d) Adoption of collaborative learning methodology: Students participate in quiz, debate, seminars and science competitions. MoU-based activities with other institutions like Faculty Exchange Programs, etc. are arranged.

(e) Strict adherence to CIA:

• **Internal and Tutorial Examination**: Formative evaluation through Internal and Tutorial Exams, are conducted as per Calcutta University examination schedule.

• **Class Tests**: Frequent class tests are conducted for formative assessment.

• **Students' Seminar**: Renowned speakers are invited to share extended views on given topics or, students share their views through seminars.

• **Remedial Coaching**: As per Internal Test scores, Remedial Coaching is provided.

• **Mentor-Mentee**: Each faculty, as mentors, are in charge of a given no. of students who ensure all-round well being of their mentee.

3. Review, Evaluation & Quality Assurance Measures:

(a) Internal Audit: Annual Internal Academic and Administrative Audit Reports are prepared.

(b) PO, CO & PSO mapping: PO, CO and PSO Mappings, displayed on College Website, are done to trace student achievement and to locate areas of academic weakness.

(c) Feedback collection: Departmental meetings and Parent-teacher meetings are organized regularly to obtain effective feedback for quality enhancement.

Human Values

The fundamentals of the human values are illuminated in the curriculum framework of the social sciences subjects like **Economics**, **Philosophy**, **Bengali and English**. The subject's matters are intended to woven compassion, empathy and social responsibilities in a graduate. The concepts of social processes and social wellbeing are taught under Human Geography.

Environment and sustainability

The syllabi of **Economics, Botany, Chemistry, Microbiology, B.Ed., and Education** cover various aspects of the environment, including the biosphere, ecosystems, ecology, biodiversity, sustainable development, renewable and non-conventional energy sources, resource conservation, environmental economics, environmental ethics, green chemistry, and more.

It also covers the concept, principles, indicators, and approaches of sustainable

development, along with the inclusion of policies and programs. Project submission on ENVS is compulsory for all the students.

College celebrates **World Environment Day** through many programs like **tree plantation programme**, **Environmental Awareness Campaign** etc.

Extracurricular and Co-curricular Activities

Beyond the classroom, the institution offers a range of extracurricular and co-curricular activities that support the integration of these crosscutting issues. College is involved in various activities that practically targets the social issues and works for the betterment of community by conducting campaign on **dengue**, **AIDS**, **Covid-19**, **Programs on Beyond 'Religion**, **Rights and responsibilities of child and neo adults**, **Transgender movement**, **rally for drugs**, **initiative to Gender equity and also conducting cloth distribution drive**, **blood donation camp** etc. College also organised **'Mobile Library'**, a unique service for elderly people of locality where students spend some time reading few pages from book chapters.

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The entire internal and external assessment system is scheduled by Calcutta University. The Summative Assessment structure is predetermined. But we have developed a strong mechanism of Formative Assessment through CIE (Continuous Internal Evaluation) to monitor the learning progression, to identify the areas of improvement through feedback. It includes:

- • **Quiz**: to enhance aptitude and reasoning ability.
- · Class tests: to improve overall understanding and retention of course content.
- • Student seminars: to develop public speaking skill.
- • **Debates**: to strengthen argumentation skills and ability to articulate and defend a position.

Transparent Mechanism of Internal/External Assessment:

A. Pre-notified Schedule: (CLARITY)

- Academic Calendar contains tentative schedule.
- Calcutta University declares actual schedule.

B. Decentralised Examination system: (ACCOUNTABILITY)

- Each department consecutively bears the responsibility of conducting internal & external exam, headed by academic committee.
- Examination Sub-committee conducts IA in well planned manner- drawing routine, question paper & answer scripts collection and submission, result declaration.
- From schedule to change in schedule (if any) every minute details are displayed on college website and college app.

C. QR Code system: (ACCESSIBILITY)

DEPARTMENTAL PO, PSO AND CO

Uluberia College whole heartedly believe that quality is never an accident. It is always the result of high intention, sincere effort, intelligent direction and skilful execution. Program Outcome (PO), Program Specific Outcomes (PSO) and Course Outcomes (CO) of each and every department are the outcome of that belief.

- The POs, PSOs and COs are prominently displayed on the College website, making them easily accessible for students and all stakeholders which helps students and parents to get acquainted with the program details prior to their admission in the respective programs as well as our College. Response:

"The illiterate of the 21st century will not be those who cannot read and write,

But those who cannot learn, unlearn, and relearn."

Uluberia College focuses on what students learn and not what our faculty members teach. The college takes utmost care of our beloved student for achieving all PO, PSO and CO in every part and every possible way. Our college follows certain process towards assessment and evaluation of attainment for all PO. These are as follows.

PO-CO MAPPING:

- Our college has used the process of Mapping of PO and CO to ensure alignment between overarching goals of a program (Program outcome) and the specific learning outcomes of individual courses (Course outcome) within the program.
- The first step is to develop rubrics and other assessment tools that clearly define the criteria for evaluating each PO and CO.
- Specific benchmarks or performance levels that students must achieve to be considered proficient in each outcome.
- Match each course outcome (CO1,CO2,CO3 etc.) of particular course to the desired and collected one or more program outcomes (PO1,PO2,PO3 etc.) by using the matrix.
- For the matching we have used the correlation parameter as

"1" - Slight (Low) Correlation indicated by S

"2" - Moderate (Medium) Correlation indicated by M

"3" - Substantial (High) Correlation indicated by H

"-" indicates there is no correlation.

• After the mapping process is finalised, we have calculated the mapping attainment level of each POs and then we have fixed the target attainment level of all POs in 3 point scale.

ATTAINTMENT OF POs:

• As the college is not an autonomous body, its assessment process is done by

DIRECT assessments (80% weight age)

INDIRECT assessments .(20% weight age)

- **Direct assessment** is based on the assessment/ examination/ Test of each Course, where 70% weight age is given for attainment through university exam and 30% weight age is given for attainment through internal assessments.
- Indirect assessment is done through Graduate exit survey (GES) and alumni survey (AS) where Graduate exit survey and alumni survey is given a weight age of 50% each.
- We have considered again 3 point scale for this. Percentage of marks obtained is linked with attainment level.
- At the end of the program average of **Direct attainment level (DAL**) is obtained for each course. By putting the average DAL for the correlated POs we get our Acquired DAL.
- From the **GRADUATE EXIT SURVEY** and **ALUMNI SURVEY** for each program outcomes we obtained the average attainment value of each PO.

CALCULATION OF GAP:

• Providing values of TARGET ATTAINENT LEVEL, DIRECT ATTAINMENT LEVEL, and INDIRECT ATTAINMENT LEVEL we can calculate the OVERAL ATTAINMENT LEVEL. i.e. 80% OF DAL + 10% OF GES + 10% OF AS. From the values TARGET ATTAINMENT LEVEL AND OVERALL ATTAINMENT LEVEL a gap is considered.

GAP ANALYSIS & ACTION PLAN: (FEEDBACK LOOP AND MONITORING):

- GAP is a strategic planning tool used to assess the disparity or "gap" between the Target level (DESIRED) and Attainment level (CURRENT). It involves identifying areas where there is a difference between where our college is and where we want to be.
- If the attainment value does not meet the target one then some significant and appropriate strategies or actions are taken to bridge the gaps for each specific program outcomes to **develop** an action plan and continuous improvement.

The college offers a wide range of facilities that enhance the teaching-learning experience, cultural and sports activities, and overall student well-being.

The college has **75 classrooms** spread across **6 different blocks** to accommodate students.

The Physics Department maintains laboratories for General Electronics, Computational Studies, Classical Mechanics, Thermodynamics, and Optics. The Chemistry Department houses three laboratories, including the A.P.C. Ray Research Laboratory. The Botany, Zoology, Physiology, and Microbiology Departments each maintain well-equipped laboratories, with the Zoology Department's Boost Laboratory being a highlight. The Geography Department offers practical experience in the Shiba Prasad Chatterjee Hall.

Language Lab:

The **B.Ed Section** has a Language Laboratory within the building.

Central Computer Lab:

- The **Department of Computer science** has 1 laboratory with 12 desktops.
- **Boolean Computing Laboratory** is a separate laboratory with 49 desktops.

Computing Equipment:

The laboratories are equipped with **desktops**, **laptops**, printers and scanners having **high-speed internet connectivity** along with modern software.

Library:

Located in Block B of college campus, the library has a collection of around 50000 (fifty thousand) books along with journals, newspaper, magazine and competitive book section. 25 desktops/laptops/tabs with internet connection are available for faculty and students.

ICT-Enabled Facilities

Sports Facilities:

The college facilitates a range of **sports amenities** including c**arom**, **table tennis**, **football**, **cricket gear**, **chess**, **ludo and accessories for athletics**, **karate mats**, **complete karate kits**, **and sports first aid kit**. **Karate training** is regularly conducted by external trainers. A designated ground is available for outdoor games and sports.

Other Facilities

• The **Student Activity Centre** provides facilities for **physical exercise**, **yoga**, and other activities, all guided by external trainers. The college has four auditoriums across different blocks, each fully equipped for events. Other amenities include **separate canteens for students and teachers**, **solar panels, fire extinguishers, water purifiers, and high mast lights for safety at night**.

• The campus is equipped with an elevator, wheelchair accessibility and ramp for disabled persons, a rainwater storage system, air-conditioned staff rooms, and an animal house for experimentation. There are separate common rooms and washrooms for male and female students, as well as specially equipped facilities for students with disabilities. 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

Uluberia college library started in the year 1948 with some donated books from individuals and teachers of the locality. It consists of the **Central library** along with some well managed **Departmental libraries**. The **Central Library** is located in the **block B** of the college campus. The college library has books available around **fifty thousand** and some special book collections of around **four hundred and fifty (450)** of the founder of the college Late Sri Haripada Ghoshal.

Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

Automation and Digital Facilities:

• The library is fully automated using an advanced Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) using KOHA Software **installed in the year 2015** which serves as the backbone of its organizational and operational activities. All the books have already been incorporated in the database.

Digital Catalogue:

• The digital catalogue of the Uluberia College Library can be used via Online Open Access Catalogue (link:https://ucdigitals.in:8000/).

User Accounts:

• Faculty and students have personalized library accounts which can be used through the college App and KOHA. The user account helps to manage their borrowed books and access digital resources. Notifications and alerts about due dates, new arrivals, and reserved items are sent automatically to their registered emails.

Library Infrastructure

The Central library houses Librarians 'Room, equipped with desktops, scanner and printers, Circulation area, Reference Books section, Stack room and a Baggage counter with security. **Open Access Library** for students and teachers where Students can **self check-in and check-out** by College APP /QR code through **tablets**. Students' college identity card also serves as the library card with the bar code. There are **Bar Code Reader**, **OER repository**, **Online Attendance**, **Reprographic services**, **vending machine** with Competitive Book, magazine Section and Newspaper Stand.

Subscriptions to E-Resources and Journals

E-Resources:

• The library subscribes to a vast array of e-resources, including e-books, e-journals through N-LIST.

Other Resources:

• The institution has memberships in The British Council Library and USIS Library, Kolkata which the faculty and students can access.

Institutional Repository

The library is taking initiatives to make soft copies of old books (more than 50 years) which are out of print or rarely available in the market and to digitize the printed books donated by the founder Principal Sri Haripada Ghoshal and make the resources available to the stakeholders through online catalogue.

Optimal Usage by Faculty and Students

Reading and Study Areas:

• The library has one spacious **Reading section** for students and a separate reading room for teachers. Students may borrow books against identity cards with the help **of tablets** in the **circulation area**.

Orientation Programs:

• At the beginning of each academic year an **orientation programme** named **Know Your Library** is organised for first semester students to get them acquainted with the library resources, their utilisation, facilities, rules and regulations, ILMS etc.

Research Support:

• Librarians provide research support services, including assistance with literature searches for books and journals to both faculty and students.

Extended Hours and Accessibility:

• Normally the college library operates from 9 am to 6 pm six days a week. Library services are extended during summer recess. Additionally, the Web Online Public Access Catalogue (WebOPAC) grants round-the-clock 24/7access to the library's catalogue, enabling users to search and locate resources at their convenience.

Teaching and learning: LMS, Google Classroom and Zoom are used to ensure online class and circulation of curriculum plans, study materials and other academic resources. Online student Profile mapping portal is used for identifying slow and advance learners.

College APP/ERP: Uluberia College initiated e-governance in 2017 with ERP software from AIDNI Infotech. In 2021, the **ULUBERIA COLLEGE APP** was launched, enabling attendance tracking, student feedback, exam mark uploads, internal exam management, communication, and routine checking. The app supports 24/7 institutional management, facilitating seamless operations for students, faculty, and administration from any location.

Students' entry, exit and borrowing of books are monitored **via QR code** to maintain transparency.

2. IQAC Review of Structures & Methodologies of Operation:

- Institutional structures and methods of operation are reviewed through annual Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) Reports. Based on the audit reports, steps are taken for institutional improvements as per Governing Body recommendations.
- Records of **departmental and individual research-based and academic activities** are reviewed through the **IQAC Portal in Uluberia College** App where faculties of all Departments are to upload reports and supporting documents of their individual and departmental activities and achievements.

3. IQAC Review of Learning Outcomes:

- Frequent **class tests, guardian meets, and internal assessment**, mentoring of slow learners through tutorial classes and collecting **student feedback** on teacher performance and curriculum planning are done to review if learning outcomes have been attained in the university-prescribed subjects and programs.
- To, further, enhance learning outcomes, IQAC has institutionalised **30** Add-on Courses. Tests are conducted and certificates, issued, at the end of each of these Courses to ensure if the expected learning outcomes have been attained.
- PO and CO for each department are assessed annually and uploaded in the College Website.

Gender Audit: Uluberia College regularly conducts Gender Audits involving students, faculty, and nonteaching staff. As a coeducational institution, the college has historically upheld gender equity and remains dedicated to fairness, inclusivity, and creating an environment where everyone has equal opportunities to succeed, regardless of gender.

Gender Issues in Curriculum:

The institution offers UG and PG Courses that address pertinent gender-related issues. The gender related topics that are taught are highly diverse and include the following areas; studies on feminism, gender geography, literature and non-fictional works by women authors; writings on or about women by well known authors; gender as a social issue, gender inequalities, education and politics; women's empowerment and empowerment policies, democratic awareness through legal literacy, social issues and movements in India; and women studies in India. Best Practice – 1: Uluberia College App (One Institution; One Digital Platform): Access, Inclusion, Empowerment

A. Objectives of the Practice:

- **Improve attendance register**: Online/offline attendance system for students and staff to enhance accuracy.
- **Engagement**: Encourage active student participation and facilitate real-time notifications, online exams, class schedules, assignments, and study materials.
- **Optimizing the resource access:** Easy access to learning resources, including library materials and LMS content.
- **Continuous improvement and quality assurance**: Feedback systems and centralized repositories like the IQAC portal helps to accelerate the improvement in teaching practices and encourage the institutional quality assurance efforts.
- Grievance Handling: Provide a platform for users to register their grievances

B. Context:

- The COVID-19 pandemic necessitated a move to digital education as traditional classrooms were no longer feasible.
- The need for digital education apps increased, offering students a safe and accessible way to continue learning from distance.
- This apps provided flexibility for own-paced learning and enabled teachers to monitor improvement, helping to overcome discontinuation in traditional education.

C. The Practice:

- Attendance Management: Teachers can register attendance, send assignments, and maintain attendance registers. Students can also register online/ offline attendance.

- Grievance Portal: Users can report grievances.
- Marksheet Repository: Marksheets for graduated students are stored for easy access.
- Internship Programme: The app manages internship programs for students.
- **IQAC/NAAC Repository:** A centralized repository for IQAC/NAAC documents is maintained for institutional quality assurance.

D. Evidence of Success:

- **Increased Attendance Accuracy:** The use of QR codes and online/offline attendance systems reduced errors and increased classroom teaching hours.
- Enhanced Engagement: Real-time notifications and improved messaging increased student engagement.
- Efficient Exam Management: A uniform platform streamlined exam-related processes.
- **Improved Access to Resources:** Instant access to schedules, materials, and library resources improved student convenience.

The COVID-19 pandemic increased the adoption of digital education, transforming teaching and learning. Through continuous innovation, Uluberia College App effectively overcomes challenges, ensuring equitable access, personalized instruction, and lifelong skill development, making it essential for the future of education.

Best Practice - 2: Mobile Library for Elderly Citizens Run by Student Volunteers

A. Objectives of the Practice:

Uluberia College initiated a program to revive reading habits among students by rewarding them for purchasing and reading books. The initiative also encourages students to volunteer by reading to elderly citizens, fostering community bonds and bridging the generation gap through shared reading experiences of scriptures, newspapers, and stories.

B. The Context

Uluberia College has tackled the decline in reading habits due to electronic media addiction by launching sensitization programs, including book reading rallies. The college also offers financial support for students to purchase non-curricular books. Students must read these books and return them to the library to receive reimbursement. This approach not only incentivizes reading but also helps students engage with diverse literature, aiming to improve concentration and overall behaviour.

C. The Practice

Uluberia College has implemented several initiatives to address declining reading habits among students and enhance intellectual growth. Recognizing the issue, the library committee developed strategies which were approved by the Governing Body. The best practices are divided into two main areas:

1. Promoting Reading Habits:

Book Fair Participation: Students are encouraged to buy books at the Uluberia Book Fair, read them, and return them to the library for reimbursement. This incentivizes reading and engages students with diverse literature.

Book Walk Rally: An annual rally to raise awareness about book reading and the book fair, creating enthusiasm and community involvement. Students and faculty actively participate, exploring books and interacting with authors.

2. Mobile Library for the Elderly:

Elderly Outreach Program: Student volunteers run a mobile library service, reading scriptures, newspapers, novels, and stories to elderly citizens. This initiative covers over 4000 households and fosters community bonds while providing companionship and intellectual stimulation to the elderly. It also helps students develop communication skills and empathy.

D. Evidence of Success

The Mobile Library program has reached over 4000 senior citizens, providing them with companionship and intellectual stimulation. This initiative has developed students' sense of duty and empathy, enhancing their communication skills and understanding of societal issues. The program has notably improved the mental and emotional well-being of the elderly, offering them purpose and connection. It has alleviated loneliness and isolation, particularly benefiting those with vision impairments by allowing them to enjoy literature through read-aloud sessions. The interaction with students has brought joy and engagement to the elderly, while also addressing their various challenges.

E. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Uluberia College tackled the challenge of fostering reading habits among students from diverse backgrounds, amid distractions from electronic media. Initiatives included a "Book Walk" for community and student awareness, and various seminars and workshops. Students were encouraged to read both library books and those they purchased themselves. Reimbursement for returned books served as positive reinforcement, motivating students to engage with diverse literature and build healthy reading habits.

F. Notes (Optional)

"Mobile Library" followed by various other awareness programme triggered a spontaneous participation of students and elderly citizens from the neighbouring community. Both the stakeholders were benefitted from the programme. The initiative received tremendous attention and appreciation from both print and electronic media. This programme was covered in the leading daily "Bartaman" on 28 December, 2022 and 12 January, 2024.

Novel Drug Development for Socioeconomically Challenged Populations: Focus on Neonatal Jaundice and Anaemia in Young Women

Vision: In our pursuit of advancing societal well-being, our institution is committed to addressing the pressing health challenges faced by socioeconomically disadvantaged communities. Situated in a region where many families experience economic hardship, our college recognizes the critical need to tackle prevalent health issues such as neonatal jaundice and anaemia in young women. These conditions are often exacerbated by socioeconomic factors, and our mission is to develop affordable, biocompatible medicines to address these unmet needs. We aspire to create innovative treatment strategies that

contribute to a healthier and more equitable future for our society.

Background: Socioeconomic status (SES) plays a pivotal role in determining health outcomes, with factors like income, education, occupation, and social class significantly influencing disease prevalence and severity. In our locality, many families face economic challenges that increase the incidence of health conditions such as anaemia and neonatal jaundice. Despite the urgent need for effective treatments, affordable options are scarce.

Our commitment to addressing these health disparities was further underscored by the tragic loss of a meritorious undergraduate student who succumbed to severe anaemia. This loss, coupled with the widespread occurrence of neonatal jaundice, galvanized our efforts to find solutions. Our focus is on developing low-cost, safe, and effective medications for these conditions, aiming to provide practical and innovative solutions that improve health outcomes for those most in need.

Praxis: Our approach to tackling these health issues involves a multifaceted strategy that integrates research with practical application:

- 1. **Research and Development:** We have initiated efforts to create novel formulations of nanomedicines in our BOOST Biotechnology Lab. Understanding that translating basic discoveries into viable drug candidates is a complex and lengthy process, we emphasize the importance of preclinical trials as a crucial step in drug development. Our goal is to establish our institution as a leading preclinical research hub, bridging the gap between research and clinical application.
- 2. **Infrastructure:** To support our research efforts, we have established the "Central Animal Facility" within the Department of Zoology at Uluberia College. This state-of-the-art facility is registered with the Committee for Control and Supervision of Experiments on Animals (CCSEA), ensuring compliance with ethical standards. Our Institutional Animal Ethics Committee (IAEC), led by Dr. Debasish Pal and supported by Dr. Siddhartha Bhattacharya and other distinguished members, oversees animal experimentation to uphold ethical and regulatory standards.
- 3. Focused Research: Over the past decade, we have concentrated our research on developing innovative nanoparticles for treating diseases prevalent in socioeconomically challenged regions. Our research encompasses a range of conditions, including neonatal hyperbilirubinemia, anaemia, ulcerative colitis, lung inflammation, Parkinson's disease, and cirrhosis of the liver. By focusing on these critical areas, we aim to provide effective and affordable treatment options for underserved populations.
- 4. Educational Integration: We believe in the importance of integrating research with education. Our institution offers hands-on experience with advanced molecular biology and biotechnology instruments, providing our students with valuable skills and preparing them for future research careers. This practical training is essential for nurturing the next generation of researchers and innovators.

Accomplishments:

Our research initiatives have yielded significant accomplishments, reflecting our commitment to improving health outcomes through innovative solutions:

• Severe Neonatal Hyperbilirubinemia Project: Our novel nano-formulation for treating severe neonatal jaundice is currently undergoing clinical trials. This project represents a crucial step

toward developing an effective and affordable treatment for this common condition.

- Anaemia Project: We have developed a nanocomplex that demonstrates both disease-preventing and therapeutic effects in cases of anaemia related to inflammation. This formulation is now available as a naoceutical, making it accessible to those in need and addressing a critical gap in treatment options.
- Ulcerative Colitis Project: Our nanoparticle formulation has shown promising results in reducing inflammatory markers and mortality rates in animal models of ulcerative colitis. This research provides a proof of concept for using nanomaterials to prevent and treat this chronic gastrointestinal condition.
- **Incubation Centre:** We have established an open-access incubation center that encourages collaborative research. This facility has hosted preclinical research by doctors and students from the National Institute of Homeopathy, Kolkata, and has provided undergraduate students with practical experience in molecular biology and biotechnology.

The institution has adopted the following initiatives for quality enhancement based on the PTR of 2nd cycle re-Accreditation:

1. At the time of NAAC 2nd Cycle visit 47.45% of total teaching posts were vacant. On top priority, we have successfully filled up 93.22% of sanctioned teaching positions. 81.01% of them are qualified with NET/SET/Ph.D degrees. Also, the college has appointed 79 SACT that have been approved by the Government of West Bengal.

2. The recommendation was to upgrade/replace the classroom furniture, in accordance with that the institution tried to enhance the overall teaching-learning experience by providing 75 classrooms well-equipped with modern teaching aids- LCD projectors, Smart Boards, Interactive digital panels.

3. The amenities in the Boys' Hostel are up to date. Following the NAAC recommendation, we have completed the entire Ladies Hostel building for allocation.

4. A Digital Language Lab for English, Bengali and Sanskrit method subject has been set up.

5. The recommendation was to conduct spoken English classes for students. The institution has initiated Communicative English Course and in addition to that Spoken Sanskrit Course as well, as a part of spreading awareness on Indian Knowledge System.

6. To lower the dropout rate, the institution has offered scholarships and freeships to 2351(2018-19), 6726(2019-20), 7330(2020-21), 8642(2021-22) students respectively.

7. The institution made significant efforts to persuade the Govt. to rationalize the appointment of teachers and successfully appointed 84 Guest Lecturers thereafter.

8. In response to recommendations from the NAAC Peer Committee, the institution has launched 20 employment oriented and 11 socially relevant Add-on courses.
